When children and teens experience trauma, they may exhibit behaviors that mask deeper needs—disengagement, aggression, anxiety, or emotional shutdown. Trauma-informed care (TIC) provides a framework for understanding these behaviors and responding in ways that prioritize safety, trust, empowerment, and healing.

However, trauma does not only affect the young people we serve—it also impacts those supporting them. Many professionals carry the emotional weight of hearing trauma disclosures or witnessing pain daily. This vicarious and secondary trauma can lead to emotional exhaustion, often mislabeled as "burnout." Without systemic support and shared responsibility for wellness, even the most dedicated staff may feel overwhelmed.

This session offers a dual lens: helping at-risk youth through trauma-informed practices and protecting the well-being of professionals. We will incorporate interactive activities—including small-group case studies and a brief yoga session—to provide instant re-regulation techniques during stressful times. Attendees will leave with strategies for individual self-care and guidance on how to advocate for institutional policies that fully support staff wellness.

A Certified Trauma Support Specialist and Certified Resilience Professional, Dr. Killian teaches courses in trauma-informed care and integrates prevention science into her leadership and pedagogy. Her work centers on key trauma-informed principles such as creating psychological safety, fostering trust and transparency, promoting empowerment and voice, and responding with cultural humility. She is the co-author of Delaware's Trauma-Informed Care in Higher Education White Paper and has contributed to several additional publications that advance trauma-informed, healingcentered practices in education. Dr. Killian actively collaborates at the state and national levels to promote systems that support student well-being, resilience, and equitable access.

New Jersey Child Placement Advisory Council



NJ CPAC operates under the auspices of the New Jersey Administrative Office of the Courts. It is a statewide council of citizens who volunteer on Child Placement Review (CPR) boards from each of the 21 New Jersey counties. At least once a month, working as a team, the CPR board volunteers review the cases of children within their counties who are placed outside their homes by the Division of Child Protection and Permanency (DCP&P), New Jersey's child welfare agency. Each CPR board makes recommendations to their judge to ensure that the best interests of these children are served.

NJ CPAC was established in 1978 by the New Jersey Legislature with the Child Placement Review (CPR) Act and has mandates including advising the New Jersey Supreme Court of the effectiveness of the CPR Act; reviewing the policies, practices and procedures of the DCP&P; and developing and delivering training for CPR Board volunteers and other organizations in the child welfare system.

NJ CPAC produces an annual report that is distributed to the New Jersey Supreme Court, the Governor and the Legislature, as mandated.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Child Placement Review (CPR) program is a key component of the NJ court's role in the oversight of children in foster care. Groups of trained judicial volunteers, appointed by the assignment judge, assist the court in reviewing cases of children placed outside of their homes by the Division of Child Protection and Permanency (DCP&P) and make recommendations to the judge.
